We pray to God today and during this month of May, to help us through all the challenges of life. We pray that we will always remain hopeful, knowing that God will always be at our side even when we are not so sure.

Easter is a celebration of hope...


People are like stained glass windows. They sparkle and shine when the sun is shining but when the darkness sets in, their true beauty is revealed only if there is a light from within.



Easter is a celebration of hope and letting the light in. This is the Easter story. The resurrection of Jesus will shatter the darkness. It has no escape. Easter is all about a great sense of hope, new beginnings and a new journey. If the story of Jesus had ended in the tomb it really would have been the end. There would have been no point continuing. The energy and momentum of his life would have been gone forever. But what happened on Holy Saturday night changed this forever. We say "Jesus is risen" rather than "Jesus has risen". There is an important distinction here. In saying that Jesus is risen means he is still with us, still present in our world and is still present in our lives. Every day when we share love, nurture it, encourage it, celebrate it, embrace it and welcome love we are living the Easter message.

We are Easter people and without the light of the Resurrection we have nothing to hold onto. Life has little meaning without it. This Easter we are invited to be open to the light of Christ in our lives. If we return to the image of stained glass window, it is about recognising the light you have within. So often we take it for granted, ignore it or pretend others have it so much better. But our light is so precious. Allow it to be rekindled and energised this Easter.

There are two ways of spreading the light, to be the candle or the mirror that reflects it.



The concept of 'Darkness to Light' has huge spiritual significance too. The Easter story is built on light shattering darkness. At the heart of the Easter story is that God is light and love. We all experience darkness, sadness and difficulties from time to time and sometimes the experience can be hugely difficult. It is good and important to know that in the midst of our deepest darkness, light is near and always will be. Even if we are not sure where this light is, we can trust that there are others who gladly want to hold the light for us.

Of huge importance is that God is not the cause of our darkness, but is very much with us in the darkness of our own lives. This means that God is always calling us towards the light and never wants us to remain stuck in darkness. We pray today for anyone who is searching for the light, anyone who is looking for the light and anyone who is not sure in which direction to search. A key feature of dawn is that it slowly takes hold and gently pushes the darkness out. May God's light gently fill your life too today and indeed every day.



On this journey we are promised that the Risen Jesus, is with us every step of the way. We are promised light, direction, energy, hope, courage, strength, meaning and fulfillment on this journey. The only expectation is to simply be open to these blessings. Nothing else is needed. It is only we who may have much bigger expectations. So if our expectations are way too high it is often best to lower them so that they match to our story, our circumstances and our pace of life. God's expectations of us are incredibly reasonable and wonderfully generous. To say that God doesn't mind if we fall asleep while saying our prayers is brilliant. There is a freedom here to just be and to simply do our best. Even if we fall short, God is still with us and nothing will ever change this. It is called the Good News of Easter. There is no need to be fearful, guilty or down hearted. We are invited to start where we are, to do our best and whatever that best may be, God is delighted with us.

Today is a good day to know that we can find God whenever and wherever we want. God is most certainly not into perfection or a perfect prayer. It is good to start where you are and with what you are doing. Throughout this week we will be reminded of the incredible love that God has for each of us. Easter is a good time to get a sense of this love. It is foundation on which many of our lives depend.

We are comfortable living on the externals. We often go through the motions, do what needs to be done, tick all the boxes and just go with the flow of life. Sometimes we drift with the flow and take everything as it comes. We don't always look within us, to our own inner feelings, thoughts, hopes and dreams. Our inner voice sometimes screams to be heard. Every healthy and good religion allows us to connect with our inner selves. We do this through prayer, quiet time, reflection, meditation, silence or taking time out to just be.

Once we give ourselves a chance to reach within, we are in fact reaching to God and doing our best to understand that God is often our stepping stone in life. When we race through life, jumping from one moment to the next, we can often forget the stepping stones. We can only find them or use them, if we slow down and take it one step at a time. When was the last time you reached within yourself? Every time we reach in, we slow ourselves down enough, to give us a genuine chance of connecting with the energy or presence of God in our life.



Our faith can help us through difficult times, helping us to find courage and strength. We feel a flicker of light and hope present. It doesn't have to be dazzling bright, but once it is there it can make all the difference. When there is no faith present, it can be much harder to deal with the challenges that life can throw at us. We pray to God today and during the coming days of Easter to help us through all the challenges of life. We pray that we will always remain hopeful, knowing that God is always on our side even when all seems lost.
